The first was the Student Engagement Initiative, encouraging students to get involved in extra-curricular activities. Student Senate supported motivational speaker Stu Saunders to visit high schools in the SCDSB. Positive feedback regarding his visits were received. The second initiative was the Mental Health Initiative. The student trustees highlighted the success of this initiative and the sharing of activities via #SCDSBLetsTalk, a social media hashtag. Mental health initiatives and activities took place at elementary and secondary schools across the board as part of this initiative. The Mental Health Initiative included the opportunity for participating schools to enter a draw with the winner receiving \$1,000 for a speaker to visit their school. Minesing Central PS was the winner of this award.

Steve Rastin, Helmet on Kids Initiative

Chairperson Peter Beacock recognized Steve Rastin. Chairperson Beacock noted that in 2011, Steve Rastin, with the support of the law firm, Rastin and Associates and the Ontario Trial Lawyers Association began the Helmets on Kids initiative in Simcoe County. Each year Mr. Rastin ensures that over 550 bike helmets are donated to the children who need them the most. Since the inception of this initiative, Mr. Rastin has donated over 2,000 bike helmets to children across Simcoe County, working closely with partners from the Simcoe County District School Board, the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board, the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit and the Barrie and Midland Police Services. Chairperson Beacock acknowledged that his contribution extends beyond the donation of helmets and put the spotlight on serious head injuries to children which can be avoided by the wearing of a proper helmet.

- 5. The FNEAC Terms of Reference Article 5 be amended to read: The Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the Committee shall be elected by the Committee at its first meeting of the calendar year.
- 6. The FNEAC Terms of Reference Article 6 be amended to read: The Committee will meet four times annually or as required.

Superintendent Finlayson indicated that these changes will be submitted on behalf of the committee to seek board approval.

#### Enrolment Report

#### Background

Information presented in this report is summarized to show the enrolment all First Nation students enrolled at a SCDSB school on February 28, 2015 under the effective Educational Services Agreements with Beausoleil First Nation and Chippewas of Rama First Nation as fee paying students. The report also shows a breakout of all SCDSB students who have voluntarily self-identified as First Nation, Métis and Inuit.

#### Enrolment on February 28, 2014

On February 28, 2015, 68 students from Beausoleil First Nation and Chippewas of Rama First Nation were enrolled at SCDSB schools as fee paying students. Total student enrolment is detailed in the table below by First Nation. The second table summarizes the total enrolment of First Nation students by school panel – elementary, secondary and continuing education learning centre.

#### First Nation Education Advisory Committee March 10, 2015 Update

#### Treaties in Ontario

In May 2014, schools in the Simcoe County District School Board (SCDSB) received a "Treaties in Ontario" map and Information for Educators resource directly from the Ministry of Education. The map was created by the Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs in order to increase awareness among educators and students about treaties in Ontario and supports the implementation strategies of our SCDSB First Nation, Métis and Inuit Education Multi-Year Plan. Specifically, in relation to the goal of supporting educators, the policy framework identifies the need for school boards to: "provide professional development opportunities that enable teachers and board leaders to increase their knowledge and awareness of Aboriginal cultures, histories, traditions, and perspectives and enhance their capacity to support Aboriginal learners more effectively."


20 Intermediate, Native Studies and Canadian History took part in a three-session PLC focusing on local treaties and land claims. In November, Chief Rodney Noganosh, Rama First Nation, opened the PLC session, followed by informative treaty and Coldwater-Narrows Land Claim presentations by Rama First Nation Council members and staff. Dave Mowat shared his expert knowledge about the Williams Treaty. Maurice Switzer shared his teachings about "We Are All Treaty People," and wampum belts.

Based on the authentic information provided in November, two further sessions were held in February and March whereby teachers focused on lesson components. A final session will be held with the purpose of creating a teachers viewing guide for a YouTube video produced by the Rama First Nation.



#### **Collaborative Inquiry**

Our collaborative inquiry work involves 23 elementary school and Mnjikaning Kendaaswin Elementary School. Three groups are focused on mathematics and one group of early primary teachers and DECEs is focused on oral language development. Lee Benson and Ernestine Baldwin are our community members who provide cultural teachings. Lee is teaching our teachers how to bead on a loom. Dr. Ruth Beatty, Mathematics Professor at Lakehead University (Orillia) and Danielle Blair, Provincial Mathematics Lead on assignment with the Ministry of Education are working within two classrooms to learn more about First Nation beadwork and the understandings of the mathematical processes associated with beading. Student and teacher learning will be shared with other southern Ontario boards on May 6<sup>th</sup> in Toronto.







  - Beausoleil First Nation








### **Coldwater-Narrows Reserve**

- Reserve was established in 1830 by Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada: Sir John Colborne
- Was an "experiment" to see if First Nations could survive on their own and adapt European ways of life
- First reserve in North America meant to serve as a pilot project for other reserves in Canada and the USA
- Wanted to create a self-sustaining farming community




## **Coldwater-Narrows Reserve**






### **Coldwater-Narrows Reserve**

- Over the next six years, the First Nations constructed a road (now Highway 12) over the old portage route between the two villages, and cleared the land along the road for farming
- Schools, houses, barns and mills were also built

### **Coldwater-Narrows Reserve**


- During this time, the Chippewas lobbied the government to try to secure title deeds and self-management of their lands
  In 1836, arrangements were made to transfer management of the reserve and ownership of the property to the Chippewas on March 31, 1837
- Non-Aboriginal settlers begin to move in and form communities
- During that year, the reserve was allegedly surrendered by the Chippewas for sale to non-Aboriginal settlers, who believed they had a right to the land
- A document was signed in Toronto on November 26, 1836 Chippewas thought it was a title deed to their lands – was actually a surrender document

## **Coldwater-Narrows Reserve**

- Indian agents moved in to disperse the Chippewas
- Already three different groups living among each other went separate ways
- Chippewas under Chief Snake went to Snake Island, then to Georgina Island

   now known as Chippewas of Georgina Island

  into two one group went to Nawash
  near Owen Sound (now Chippewas of

### THE COLDWATER MILL 1833


In 1830 Indians of the surrounding region were gathered on a reserve along a newly opened road connecting The Narrows (Orillia) and Coldwater. The superintendent. Capt. Thomas Gummersal Anderson, and a band of Olibwa under Chief Aisance, settled in Coldwater. Land-hungry settlers influenced the government to move the Indians to Rama and Beausoleil Island 1838-39. This grist-mill financed with Indian funds, was constructed by Stephen Chapman. Jacob Gill and others in 1833. The mill was sold to George Copeland in 1849 and has been in operation for over 125 years.



# **Chippewas** of Rama

- Chippewas under Chief
   Yellowhead were not
   assigned specific land and
   had to purchase their own

- This is why their reserve is scattered
- They buy available land for sale to try to come together
- Fish fence is over 5000 years old (built at the same time as the Egyptian pyramids)



### CHIEF WILLIAM YELLOWHEAD

Born about 1769, Yellowhead (Musquakie) served with the British during the War of 1812. Named chief of the Deer tribe of the Chippewa (Olibwa) Indians in 1816, he settled with his band at the site of Orillia in 1830 in accordance with Lieutenant-Governor Colborne's plan for gathering nomadic tribes on reserves. Pressure from white settlers forced the Indians to relinquish their land and Yellowhead's band moved to Rama in 1838-39. It is believed that the Muskoka District, which embraced his hunting grounds, was named after this greatly respected chief who died in 1864 and was buried in St. James' churchyard. Orillia.

### THE HURON FISH WEIRS


In the adjacent Narrows joining Lakes Simcoe and Couchiching are the remains of Indian fish weirs. They were noted by Samuel de Champlain when he passed here on September 1, 1615, with a Huron war party en route to attack the Iroquois south of Lake Ontario. The weirs consisted of large numbers of stakes driven into the bottom of the Narrows, with openings at which nets were placed to catch fish. These weirs (claies) caused Lake Simcoe to be named Lac aux Claies during the French regime. Their remains were noted by archaeologists as early as 1887, and their location was partially charted in 1955.

### RAMA INDIAN RESERVE

In 1830 Sir John Colborne, lieutenant-governor of Upper Canada (1828-1836), settled several nomadic bands of Indians on a reserve stretching along the portage between the Atherley Narrows and Georgian Bay. They were placed under the superintendency of Captain Thomas Gummersall Anderson. The Ojibwa (Chippewa) tribe led by Chief William Yellowhead (Musquakie) were located at the Atherley Narrows. Pressure on the government by land-hungry white settlers forced the Indians, in 1836, to relinquish their holdings, and Yellowhead's band was moved to Rama in 1838 -9, where they purchased 1600 acres. By 1846 they had 300 acres under cultivation and their settlement contained twenty houses, four barns and a school house.



## Land Claim

- After the Chippewas dispersed from Coldwater, they not only lost their land and the economic benefits from the reserve they built, there was also social, cultural and spiritual damage to each community
- Nearly 150 years after leaving Coldwater, research began in the 1980s regarding the reserve and the Chippewas' rights to the land
- CTC submitted a land claim in 1991 Canada rejected the claim in 1996
- However, in March 1997, legal submissions by CTC to Canada demonstrated that the "surrender" was not valid

### Land Claim

- It was not until July 23, 2002 that Canada accepted the claim under its Specific Claim Policy for negotiation
- Negotiations took place from November 2002 to November 2008
- However, negotiations stopped for a period because Canada said that Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation also had rights to the land – they were added as claimants in 2008
- Part of negotiations: map the original reserve, parts were lost in mapping; loss of use, could have made money from the mills, etc; appraisal of land value; improvements to land; bringing historical value of land to present day value

### Land Claim

- An offer was made by Canada in March 2011
- In 2012, successful referendums in all 4 communities
- Settlement includes approximately \$307 million total in financial compensation largest settlement in Canada
  - -Beausoleil, Georgina and Rama each got 30% of the settlement; Nawash received 10%
- The Chippewas are also given permission to buy back the land on a willing seller/willing buyer basis. If land anywhere in the Land Claim goes up for sale, First Nations will be asked to purchase first
- However, due to the Williams Treaty, not all rights and sovereignty are being recognized

# "Worst Treaty in History"

- The Williams Treaty is considered the worst treaty in history, and cannot even be considered a real treaty
- Between 1850 and 1920, the government realized that there were large chunks of land that had not been officially surrendered or signed off (Lake Simcoe area, moving southeast towards Lake Ontario)
- In 1916, the Sinclair Report confirmed that the government and non-Aboriginals had no right to the land
- In 1922, the Williams Report stated that the land belonged to the Native people
- In 1923, this all changed

### Precedence

- All treaties before 1923 confirmed the same rights for Aboriginal people: the right to hunt, fish, trap, own the land, etc. These rights weren't necessarily followed, but the treaties had these promises in writing
- The Royal Proclamation of 1763 also set up how treaties were to be formed and what should be included
- Non-Aboriginals began to form private hunting areas to disallow Natives from hunting on their land – done without permission from Natives
- The government decided to deal with this land quickly, using a "gunshot treaty" – this means that the Natives could not come within a "gunshot" of the land signed over

# Meetings

- Government officials began to visit each community in the fall of 1923 to discuss how they could right past wrongs with previous treaties
- They discussed new arrangements for the land to be shared, and how their rights could be met

• Government officials came back later in the fall to have the Chippewas and Mississaugas sign the treaty

### Meetings

- However, signing was based on trust only the treaty was BLANK, and each group was forced to sign, not realizing that they were giving up ALL rights to the land, as well as the right to hunt, fish, trap – their way of life
- There is also a "basket clause," which means that any claims against the treaty are invalid
- Why would all of these First Nations WILLINGLY give up their rights to the land AND their way of life?



### Serpent Mounds

### Provincial Park.

To draw more tourists, the park opened one of the mounds, built a glass bottomed bridge, and allowed people to look at and photograph the skeletons. This would be the same as opening up a cemetery to allow people to look at your relative's bodies. Protests from First Nations peoples forced the park to rebury the mound, and in 1995, the park was returned to the Hiawatha First Nation.



# **Fighting for Rights**

- The First Nations did not receive a copy of the treaty until 9 years after signing – most still could not read or understand it
- In 1977, Doug Williams, Chief of Curve Lake, and Wayne Taylor went to catch bullfrogs near Curve Lake – they were charged for poaching – they fought this in court and were acquitted based on earlier treaties (not Williams Treaty)
- All Chippewa and Mississauga nations are currently in court fighting the Williams Treaty. Earlier ideas predicted the court case would conclude in November of 2013 – they are nowhere close to coming to decisions

### Fighting for Rights

However, in 2012, the government passed legislation, which allows any of the Williams
Treaty First Nations the right to hunt, fish and trap in original Treaty 20 area only



- This includes reserve land for Scugog and Curve Lake. Any of the other five First Nations are allowed to go into that territory to hunt, fish or trap
- However, most of the land is privately owned, so a First Nations person would have to ask the landowner for permission, and have them sign a permission form

#### FIRST NATIONS EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

#### Terms of Reference

The BOARD agrees to establish and maintain the First Nations Education Advisory Committee the terms of reference for which will be as follows:

- 1. First Nations Education Advisory Committee is to be established by resolution of The Simcoe County District School Board to represent the interests of the pupils of the Chippewas of Rama First Nation and Beausoleil First Nation, herein after referred to as First Nations, as per 462/97 of the Education Act.
- 2. The Committee shall be composed comprised of:
  - (i) Voting members:
    - a) The First Nation Trustee of the Board as per the Education Act;
    - b) A First Nation Education Director/Manager/or designate for each First Nation;
    - c) Two Trustees of the Simcoe County District School Board;
    - d) One community representative or designate be appointed by each of the participating First Nations;
    - e) One elder to be appointed by each of the participating First Nations.
  - (ii) Non-voting members:
    - Principals or their designates from the Board's schools which provide educational services to First Nation pupils under educational services agreement;
    - b) The principal or designate from Christian Island Elementary School and Mnjikaning Kendaaswin Elementary School;
    - c) One Secondary student representative or their alternate to be appointed by each of the participating First Nations;
    - d) Superintendent of Schools or designate;
    - e) Ex-officio
      - Chief of Each First Nation Band or Designate
      - Director of the Simcoe County District School Board or Designate
    - f) First Nation Student Advisors from both First Nations;
    - g) Other invited guests of the First Nation Community and the Simcoe County District School Board.

- 3. The Committee members shall hold office for one calendar year with the opportunity for reappointment. The term of office of a member appointed under this section terminates on the same date as the term of office of the elected members (4 years).
- 4. Every vacancy on the Committee occasioned by the death or resignation of a member, or by any other cause, shall be filled by a qualified person and that person shall hold office for the unexpired term of such member.
- 5. The Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the Committee shall be elected by the Committee at its first meeting of the calendar year.
- 6. The Committee will meet four times annually or as required. Its first meeting of the year for election of officers will be held in the spring.
- 7. The Committee will make a report to the Board relating to the number of students attending SCDSB schools through Education Services Agreements.
- 8. The Committee through its members provide a forum for improved communications where concerns, changes or new initiatives from principals, the Board, the First Nation and the parents can be reviewed, with local consultation if required, and recommendations or reports submitted to the Board.
- 9. The Committee will provide a direct line of communication with local First Nation Community Education Authorities/Education Advisory Circles to ensure their input and interest is utilized in the self development of First Nation people in educational matters.
- 10. All Committee reports and recommendations require approval of a quorum of the voting members of the Committee for submission to the Board. A quorum of the Committee consists of four voting members.

### **Christian Island Elementary School**

Principal Johnson reported that Christian Island Elementary School have had a busy couple months with lots of fun activities for their students, staff, parents, and community. During the winter months, they like to keep everyone's spirits high and positive with the offering of their Spirit Day activities that take place on Fridays. During February, they offered a full day of activities where a community member and his wife came into the school to offer lacrosse, dream catcher and medicine bag making, and an afternoon of storytelling. On two other occasions they offered two half day sessions during February where a local fisherman came and did ice fishing with students and then the following Friday they had a fish fry and further discussions with the fisherman. During the same morning, the teachers organized a variety of relay races and team building activities for the students. Needless to say, everyone had worked up an appetite and the fish fry was a nice treat and a great way to end the day. During March, they will offer two additional half day Spirit Activities. One afternoon will consist of traditional sleigh making and the following Friday will be testing out the sleighs and sleigh riding.

During the last couple months the NSL teachers have also been doing a lot of hands on activities with the students. The activities have included beading lanyards, moccasin, choker, and shield making, snowshoeing, snaring and traditional cooking. Principal Johnson has also seen an increase in the use of technology within the NSL programs that students are having a positive response to.

February was the Seven Grandfather Love and students took part in a variety of activities within their classrooms. Principal Johnson thinks this was also their best month for the Seven Grandfather poster contest. Love was in the air and students were inspired. It was very hard to pick a winner.

Yesterday, they completed the last day of training with all of their staff. We were very fortunate to have had the opportunity to have Arrole Lawrence who is a traditional Healer/Medicine Man come into the school and share his book "There's a Little Bit of Magic in All of Us!" He not only shared his story with the students but a whole series of teachings and a different way of thinking. Just as his title of his book says, they learned about the magic and hidden potential that is within all of us and how to harness it and use it in our everyday life; how to use these teachings, practices, and way of life to inspire and empower our students.

### **Mnjikaning Kendaaswin Elementary School**

Principal Howard reported that it is nice to have the opportunity to update everyone on what they have been up to since the last meeting in January. They were pleased that Chad Solomon (author of the Bear Paws series of books) had the opportunity to talk to their Grade 1, 2 and 3 students. This visit was arranged by SCDSB and was very much appreciated. They took this visit as a chance to supplement their Reading Together programme books. As the Seven Grandfather Teachings are the cornerstone of their Code of Conduct at MKES being able to purchase Chad Solomon's new series 'The Sacred Seven' was a real bonus. They have been working very hard to give their students a greater understanding of the Seven Grandfather teachings, animals associated and why, Ojibwe spellings, etc. They have even been trying to link their comments to students with the teachings as part of their normal interactions. Grades 4 to 8 students completed work packages related to the teachings and assessments were conducted. They have followed this up by all classes doing some work on The Seven Grandfathers and the Little Boy from the Mishomis Book by Edward Benton-Banai. It is important that their students and staff understand the story of the seven Teachings. They have also tried to make their monthly newsletter more

interactive for students and parents. Principal Howard was very pleased that some of their Kindergarten staff participated in the Little Spirits organized by SCDSB. They had a great time learning and networking.

It's a busy time for Grade 8 students with high school looming! Their sports teams have been busy with hockey, free throw, volleyball, basketball and floor hockey. Many of their parents were able to attend the Orillia Legion Remembrance Day awards ceremony and the Brechin Legion Oral Speaking competition. It is always wonderful having parents share the achievements of their children. Twenty Lakehead University students came into school as part of their Aboriginal Studies unit. This is a great opportunity for the university students to see an elementary school in action and have the chance to ask questions. They have celebrated The Day of Pink and Random Acts of Kindness Day at MKES. They had a very successful Winter Carnival/Jump Rope for Heart with lots of parental involvement. The organizers of the Paso por Paso initiative are bringing cards designed by Mayan students in Guatemala into MKES for their students.

They have been busy at MKES, as all are trying to provide a wide range of educational activities to develop the whole child.

'If we wonder often, the gift of knowledge will come.'

### Lions Oval Public School

Principal Halliday reported that since the last meeting, they have had Raven Cotnam coming on a weekly basis to work alongside Sara Flemming to give time to their self-identified students. These opportunities involve storytelling, cultural discussions and crafts. It also provides their students with a chance to discuss what they are working on and goals for the third term. They are eagerly anticipating their Celebration of the Arts day which will involve having a local First Nations storyteller. Scott Debassigne working with their students for two days. This will take place in mid-May. The school community will be invited in to view various student produced artwork (including that modelled by Morisseau and Harrison) and will be participants in creating some art pieces for their permanent collection in the front foyer. The theme of this art project will be "The Four Elements". Although there is much work lying ahead in preparation for the evening, they eagerly look forward to this event as a means of highlighting FNMI culture and traditions.

### Regent Park Public School

Principal Ewanchuk reported on behalf of Principal Campbell that the Regent Park Primary Literacy Night included three snuggle up and read sessions with teachers, parents and students. One of the three sessions was a First Nations legend which was shared with parents and students while sitting on our Seven Grandfather Teachings carpet. Before the story Roseanne Mancari shared the Animal Totems with the children and answered their questions.

Over \$3000 has been spent in the library to expand the FNMI collection. Their Indigo grant will allow them to make this level of purchasing for the next 2 years. They welcome any suggestions of titles anyone can recommend.

In December they had their Community Mental Health Feast. The Enaahtig Healing Lodge and Learning Centre attended and shared lots of information with their school community. They are also coming into the school on a regular basis to work with a few students.

Community circles are still used to help solve bigger issues in classrooms and help students mend relationships with each other. To date they have not had the need for any formal Restorative Circles this year and they view this as a positive.

Angelise Griffin is one of their grade 8 FNMI students and she is presently at Tim Horton's camp engaging in cultural experiences for the week.

### Rama Central Public School

Principal Lefuel reported on Student Achievement/Student Success:

The school improvement plan as a working document has been modified to reflect a greater focus on the monitoring and provision of interventions for students who are self-identified. Students have been achieving well both academically and in the learning skills which tie into their continued focus of improving resiliency and a growth vs. fixed mindset.

One junior teacher recently attended the Ministry conference through Principal Ewanchuk. The focus on the web-conference was about developing success criteria and action/monitoring plans for the inquiry based learning. On May 6<sup>th</sup>, there will be a face-to-face meeting in Brampton and they're hoping to share their school's learning and progress.

Another junior teacher plans to once again this year, partner with Mnjikaning *Kendaaswin Elementary School* for the "Students teaching Students" days. This partnership allows students to learn directly from one another and was a powerful learning opportunity.

On May 14, fifty students will be attending the Spirit Horse presentation at Harriett Todd Public School.

Safe and Inclusive Schools:

Classroom community agreements are now well established in all classrooms and the use of restorative practices has supported a positive school climate.

The school has a trained Restorative Practices facilitator who has been released to support his colleagues in establishing best practices to run classroom circles and model the process. This has been very healing and has helped students develop a voice as well as empathy towards each other. The implementation of consistent use of classroom community meetings has become embedded into our school culture.

### Twin Lakes Secondary School

Principal Toor reported that course selections are happening right now; they have three FNMI themed offerings – Ojibwe language, Native Studies and Contemporary Aboriginal Voices (which counts as an English credit).

The field trips and guest speakers (Ralph King) for the Native Studies class have tentative dates in April.

They have a meeting Thursday for students interested in attending the 'Our Voices' Conference; their FNMI coach and their Native Studies teachers are meeting with students to explain what it is and to encourage them to sign up.

Two of our FNMI students are participating in an exchange and trip to the Netherlands (in May).

We have several FNMI identified students who have applied for college or university programs and a few have already received acceptances.

#### **OD/Park Secondary School**

At present, there are 56 students who have formally self-identified as First Nations, Métis, or Inuit (*16 are from Rama*); additionally, there are another dozen students who have disclosed this aspect of their cultural identity to a guidance counsellor or to the FNMI student advisor.

There will be 9 FNMI students who will be graduating in June as well as one who graduated as of the end of semester one; five have applied to a college or university of their choice. They are being assisted with their applications for band funding as well as in applying for post-secondary assistance, and financial supports. Our other graduates are choosing to enter the work force or pursue an apprenticeship; they too are being assisted with transitional supports.

During the month of February, our equity and inclusion group *United Differences* educated our school community as to aspects of FNMI culture. Creative works from FNMI students are on display in hallways and daily announcements shared the 7 Grandfather teachings. Teachers in all homeroom classes are being encouraged to hold a sharing circle with their period one class before the end of March.

We have one section of Native Studies running this semester: a combined grade 11 college/workplace course, NBV3C/3E. Students are actively engaged in learning about the cultures, traditions, and contemporary beliefs of Aboriginal peoples in Canada. We are fortunate to have several guests scheduled to come in over the course of the semester to share their authentic voices and perspectives. There are also field trips planned, including the Sharing Our Learning event in April.

### Midland Secondary School

Principal Fletcher reported that this semester MSS is offering three Native Studies courses. There are two sections of English: Contemporary Aboriginal Voices, Grade 11, College Preparation (NBE3C) course with a combined enrollment of 40 students and Expressing Aboriginal Cultures, Grade 9, Open level (NAC10) with 16 students.

In the Grade 11 course students have been looking at creation myths from around the world to compare and contrast various cultures, learning about Aboriginal beliefs and values for various First Nation groups, Métis and Inuit and Aboriginal issues from throughout history and present day, and why it is important to understand and recognize them today. Specific to our area they have learned about the Coldwater-Narrows Land Claim and Williams Treaty. Students completed diary entries and/or newspaper reports in the perspective of time period and experience. They have started a group reading project with various Aboriginal texts, which includes both collaborative and independent tasks and will be participating shortly in different hands-on tasks presented by members of the community in (Métis Nation of Ontario, Georgian Bay Native Friendship Centre, etc.). Students will also be participating in Project of Heart, a hands-on, collaborative project to honour residential school victims and survivors.

In the grade 9 course students have been focusing their studies on notable Inuit, First Nations and Métis People with research on totem poles created by nine First Nations People. Students are creating their own painted totem pole using either traditional symbols, contemporary symbols or a combination of traditional and contemporary symbols. Students are writing artist's statement of their totem pole. Their artworks will be exhibited at the Quest Gallery of the Midland Cultural Centre from May 1 until June 6.

#### 7<sup>th</sup> Fire

7<sup>th</sup> Fire currently has 19 students enrolled. Courses offered this semester are: Ojibwe (LNOAO, LNOBO, LNOCO), Geography (CGC1P, CGG3O), Science (SNC1P, SVE3E) and Family Studies (HIF2O, HIP3E). Some students participated in a GBNFC initiative to make a film about how youth utilize resources at Friendship Centres. Again this year students have the opportunity to earn their G1 and attend a driving course funded through the GBNFC. Male students will continue to be part of the Gentleman Circle once a week at the Friendship Center in the evening, run by staff of GBNFC.

The students continue to be supported by their student advisors. Their instructional coach is focusing on achievement in grade 9 and 10 applied math this semester. Last semester with this focus on grade 9 math applied math and science, 100% of FNMI students in these courses achieved their credit.

#### Penetanguishene Secondary School

Principal MacIsaac reported that the PSS students and staff continue to work on cultural awareness with opportunities to celebrate the cultural backgrounds of our community. In the First Nation Contemporary Literature class, students have been learning a little about the history of our first peoples from a novel called *Cibou*. This novel examines the French relationship that developed from the fictional perspective of a Mi'kmaq woman. We will also talk about the Seven Grandfather teachings when they come up in the novel. Additionally, using the film *The Last of the Mohicans*, students are going to make some comparisons between the French and English, and their treatments of First Nation peoples. We will be spending some time discussing the medicine wheel and the different ways it can be used to talk about a community and beliefs.

Students have learned about worldview and the number of stereotypes that exist, and we have also discussed the importance of understanding culture from the perspective of the Nation involved. Students were given the opportunity to examine and discuss the *Culture Cards* that we were given last year. Many of them learned a lot just from this one pocket-sized reference. Students have also enjoyed two other films - *Reel Injun*, a documentary about the impact of Hollywood on the perspective the world has about First Nations peoples, and *Smoke Signals* - a film about the importance of storytelling and understanding individual identity. We've also talked a little about sovereignty and the challenges that sometimes arise.

When the class has finished the novel *Cibou* we will move into further examining treaties and the impact these documents have had. This will then lead to discussion surrounding the Indian Act and serve as an introduction to *Red Wolf*, another novel that is written from the perspective of a boy being moved by his family to residential school. This novel will provide opportunity for survivor videos and an examination of Stephen Harper's apology. Students will also complete a research project on the displacement of First Nations people.

Additionally, I'm hoping that we'll have opportunity to create dream catchers and share in a meal of 'Indian Tacos.' Our Christian Island students will be invited to join us for the lunch and I'm hoping that they will share some of their experiences in riding the ferry and hovercraft to school, and boarding away from home during the week. This will be done in a very casual manner.

To finish up the semester we'll read and perform a two-act play, *Someday* by Drew Haydon Taylor. Students will be able to see the disruption to the characters' lives because of the sixties scoop. Again, we will continue to discuss identity and the difficulties involved in understanding where one

comes from. This will be further looked at from the documentary perspective presented in the film *Club Native*.

This semester PSS has once again offered the Ojibwe language class. The class has been working on getting used to using the Fiero system (Double Vowel System). The long and short vowel sounds differ from the English vowels sounds that we are used to. We are also incorporating these vowel sounds with different consonants and learning the significance of animate and inanimate nouns in the Anishinaabe language. Students will soon be starting the process of creating a fun and interactive Anishinaabe game incorporating as much language as possible and using technology where applicable.

The class will continue to learn basic conversation pieces/sentences as well as personal pronouns, interrogatives, pejorative etc. The class will learn different themes/groupings such as numbers, money, days of the week, animals and other items. We will also look at past, present, future, and negative tense verbs.

Students received information about the black bear program. It is a summer opportunity providing aboriginal youth a 7 week paid (\$3500) summer Armed Forces entry program specific to First Nations youth. It is based out of New Brunswick (transportation also provided). The Deadline for applications is the end of March.

During semester two the grade 9 art class, Expressing Aboriginal Culture has offered students opportunities to learn about First Nation customs from across Canada. It is the start of the new term so we just finished some art foundations like art language and colour theory. We are beginning to explore Canadian First Nation culture and art styles with the Northwest Coastal art. We are starting to create art using Ovoid, u-shapes, s-shapes and Split u-shapes. Next we will be looking at Inuit art and exploring sculpture and printmaking techniques.

Students from Christian Island Elementary School joined other PSS feeder schools in late February as part of our grade eight to grade nine transition programs. Students participated in various classes, fun activities and heard from teachers of various programs to assist in their course selection. PSS staff will be visiting our future students once again in May prior to them joining us in September.

#### Rama Student Advisor

Semester 2 is off to a good start, some students made course changes and most were met with to discuss their credit accumulations, etc. Next task - follow-up Interim Reports and plan to attend the Parent-Teacher Interview Night.

University of Toronto representatives for the Summer Mentorship Program visited TLSS and OD/PARK in February to promote this 4 week health sciences program, to the eligible FNMI students.

Planning for "A Day on Bay" – this event is being hosted by the Jr. Economic Club of Canada and we hope to take 25 students to the Toronto Stock Exchange and other planned activities, on May 19<sup>th</sup>.

Arlana reported that exams went well and that she finished semester 1 with honours. She is looking forward to the new semester start.

Arlana was involved with the Match Makers survey for Valentines student council fundraiser and has been peer assisting in Mme LeMaire's grade 9 Physical Education Class. Arlana is thoroughly enjoying this opportunity.

As part of student council they hosted the semi-formal dance on February 20th and it was successful!

School volleyball is now completed. Arlana is continuing with club volleyball practices and tournaments. Arlana noted that athletic council is starting to plan for the annual school volleyball-a-thon to be held April 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Arlana informed the committee that she has been accepted to Georgian College for Occupational Therapy Assistant & Physiotherapy Assistant for September 2016.

Principal Delaire outlined the culture of learning established in SEF schools and the evidence of impact that is used as success criteria.

#### 3. <u>Simcoe County District School Board Special Education Plan 2015-2016 (PRO-I-3)</u>

Superintendent of Education Chris Samis indicated that the plan is a reporting requirement of the Ministry of Education and includes a parent-friendly guide to special education, and details the supports and services offered to students with special education needs.

Superintendent Samis responded to trustee comments and queries related to the supports available to students based on individual need rather than specific diagnoses, and the timing of Identification, Placement and Review Committee meetings.

#### 4. <u>Health and Physical Education Curriculum (VERBAL)</u>

Superintendent Simpson and Principal Maltby provided trustees with a verbal update on the implementation of the revised Health and Physical Education (HPE) curriculum for Grades 1 to 12 students, scheduled to commence in September 2015. Principal Maltby detailed the learning that took place with secondary HPE teachers recently. Superintendent Simpson indicated that the plans for implementation include the creation of videos to assist teachers with Daily Physical Activity (DPA) that give students "brain breaks" and encourages focused learning in the classroom.

Superintendent Simpson responded to a trustee query related to the current labour action and the related impact on the implementation of this curriculum.

## 5. <u>April 8 Program Standing EQAO Presentation: Follow Up Trustee Questions (PRO-I-4)</u>

Superintendent Simpson invited Manager of Research and Evaluation Sandra Sangster to the table. Chair Armstrong thanked Manager Sangster for her years of service.

Superintendent Samis responded to a trustee query related to the identification of special education needs for primary students. Superintendent Simpson and Manager Sangster responded to trustee queries related to the cancellation of the EQAO standardized tests for Grades 3 and 6 this year, the accommodations provided to students with learning exceptionalities, and the language of the EQAO test for students in the FI program.

As part of the Education Services Agreement (ESA), the consent to provide information issue remains with age differences between the two forms. As a board, in order to provide access to student information, the SCDSB require permission for students 18 and under and First Nations require ages 16 and under. Trustee Shilling recommended that the board form be used and any questions/concerns would be dealt with on an individual basis. Superintendent Finlayson will request clarification from the Ministry of Education.

## FIRST NATIONS EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

## **Terms of Reference**

The BOARD agrees to establish and maintain the First Nations Education Advisory Committee the terms of reference for which will be as follows:

- 1. First Nations Education Advisory Committee is to be established by resolution of The Simcoe County District School Board to represent the interests of the First Nations as per 462/97 of the Education Act.
- 2. The Committee shall be composed of:
  - (i) Voting members:
    - a) The First Nation Trustee of the Board as per the Education Act;
    - b) A First Nation Education Director/Manager/or designate for each First Nation;
    - c) Two Trustees of the Simcoe County District School Board;
    - d) One community representative or designate be appointed by each of the participating First Nations;
    - e) One elder to be appointed by each of the participating First Nations.
  - (ii) Non-voting members:
    - Principals or their designates from the Board's schools which provide educational services to First Nation pupils under educational services agreement;
    - b) The principal or designate from Christian Island Elementary School and Mnjikaning Kendaaswin Elementary School;
    - c) One Secondary student representative or their alternate to be appointed by each of the participating First Nations;
    - d) Superintendent of Schools or designate;
    - e) Ex-officio
      - Chief of Each First Nation Band or Designate
      - Director of the Simcoe County District School Board or Designate
    - f) First Nation Student Advisors from both First Nations
    - g) Other invited guests of the First Nation Community and the Simcoe County District School Board.

- 3. The Committee members shall hold office for one calendar year with the opportunity for reappointment. The term of office of a member appointed under this section terminates on the same date as the term of office of the elected members (4 years).
- 4. Every vacancy on the Committee occasioned by the death or resignation of a member, or by any other cause, shall be filled by a qualified person and that person shall hold office for the unexpired term of such member.
- 5. The Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the Committee shall be elected by the Committee at its first meeting of the calendar year.
- 6. The Committee will meet four times annually or as required. Its first meeting of the year for election of officers will be held in the spring.
- 7. The Committee will make a report to the Board relating to the number of students attending SCDSB schools through Education Services Agreements.
- 8. The Committee through its members provide a forum for improved communications where concerns, changes or new initiatives from principals, the Board, the First Nation and the parents can be reviewed, with local consultation if required, and recommendations or reports submitted to the Board.
- 9. The Committee will provide a direct line of communication with local First Nation Community Education Authorities/Education Advisory Circles to ensure their input and interest is utilized in the self development of First Nation people in educational matters.
- 10. All Committee reports and recommendations require approval of a quorum of the voting members of the Committee for submission to the Board. A quorum of the Committee consists of four voting members.

# **Christian Island Elementary School**

Principal Johnson reported that this is the year of change for their school! Every time they turn around there is something changing or unexpected happening. Change is and can be good though. It just takes some time to adjust.

As Principal Johnson expressed in October, this year they have had a high turnover and a loss of some staff at their school. Unfortunately, they have and are still experiencing some loss. For example, they were unable to hire a new NSL teacher (they had one of their Native Language teachers retire in November) and they just hired a new Grade 1 teacher. On a positive note, Principal Johnson is pleased to announce that they were able to hire a consistent temporary secretary in November and that they will be with them at least until the end of this month. Their Community Culture Lead is helping them in filling the gap regarding the loss of their one Native Language teacher and through Otter funding they were also able to hire an IT person and an additional EA until the end of March.

Over the past couple months their students have been enjoying the Sewing/Knitting Club and have completed some wonderful final projects (pillows, etc.). The club was offered for Grades 1-8. The Seven Grandfather Units are going very well and they are on their fourth set of student created Seven Grandfather posters for the school. They are beautiful and the students are enjoying seeing their work professionally printed and made into posters and plaques.

Activities they are looking forward to are the Annual Spirit Day activities that they host for their students during February and March. The activities are primarily culture based. Some of the activities include making homemade sleighs, traditional cooking, fire starting, craft making, storytelling, etc.

Principal Johnson also shared that their Annual School Pow Wow is scheduled for Wednesday, May 20<sup>th</sup>. Invites will be sent to schools.

## Mnjikaning Kendaaswin Elementary School

Principal Howard began by wishing everyone a Happy New Year and a wonderful 2015. He reported that as we go into 2015 it is important to reflect on our successes and challenges and continue the process of school improvement.

In December they had a number of activities that took place. Kim Jackson (Kerry's Place) visited all their classes and talked to the students about 'Celebrating our Differences'. These presentations were very thought provoking for the students. At Mnjikaning Kendaaswin elementary School (MKES) they believe in inclusion for all but that sometimes requires a different mind-set for both students and staff. They are participating in an initiative called Paso Por Paso created in 2005 by a group of retired Orillia high school teachers. This is a charity that works with a Mayan community in Guatemala. Their involvement will be to write cards to Mayan students in the elementary school. Warminster PS has been involved for a number of years. It seems very appropriate for their students to connect with aboriginal students in another country. Their Christmas Concert was very successful with much of it done in Ojibwe. Each year the audience seems to get bigger and bigger. A good time was had by everyone. As part of the Healthy Eating initiative the Rama Health Unit provide two Smoothie/Salad Days per month for all students. They provide fruit for all students at Snack. Principal Howard was pleased to say that the MKES Boys

Drum Group has started again. They have missed the sound of the big drum in school. One of their staff members is delighted to be involved in the Collaborative Inquiry programme organized through SCDSB. On Sunday January 25<sup>th</sup> twelve of their students and their families will be attending the Orillia Branch of the Canadian Legion's Remembrance Day awards banquet. They held an EQAO Parents evening for their Grade 3 and 6 students. The purpose was to inform parents of the process and to encourage their support for their child's learning. Their FNSSP team leads are provided with release time to further develop their programmes to: raise pupil attainment in Mathematics and Literacy, to encourage greater parental participation in their child's education and to incorporate more cultural opportunities within the curriculum.

As Eddie Box, Southern Ute, says so eloquently 'The battle for Native children will be won in the classroom, not on the streets or on a horse. The students of today are our warriors of tomorrow'.

# Lions Oval Public School

Principal Halliday reported that they have two staff members who continue to work alongside teaching colleagues in the FNMI Inquiry. Jill Spurr (Kindergarten) is part of a group working with an Oral Language focus and Beth Garrett (Grade 3) is part of a collective focusing on Math skills. The great part about this inquiry is that these teachers are bringing back their learnings to share with their divisional and grade team colleagues for the benefit of our FNMI students.

The Lions Oval team continues to look forward to their Celebration of the Arts evening in May. They will be having a First Nations storyteller joining them for 2 days leading up to the event and then on the evening when families are visiting to see the many, wonderful art creations of their students, they will be creating large pieces of art focused on either "The Four Elements" or "The Four Seasons". They are working with the SCDSB Media Department and their Arts Itinerant Resource teacher to best determine how they are going to make these products part of their permanent display in the front foyer but are leaning towards digitizing the art and transferring them over to some form of media (flags, banners etc.) for display.

## Rama Central Public School

# Student Achievement/Student Success:

Principal Lefuel reports that the implementation of the newly revised Social Studies curriculum continues to be a school priority along with the enhancement/use of available technology.

This term, the grade 5 students and their teacher will be accessing Skype to communicate with a First Nations community. They will be using iPads to try to determine the location of the community using pre-determined questions and the internet to guess the initially undisclosed location. The hope is to connect our students to other Canadians to enhance their experience and connection with First Nations communities.

Two teachers (one junior, one intermediate) are involved in the FNMI collaborative inquiry which focuses on student achievement with a particular focus on Mathematics. Data is collected and analyzed over time as part of this Ministry of Education professional development opportunity under the leadership of Lisa Ewanchuk.

Students in grades 4, 5 and 6 will also be invited to a special presentation by Chad Solomon, author of "Adventures of Rabbit and Bear Paws" on January 14<sup>th</sup>. Students and staff are looking forward to this opportunity.

## Twin Lakes Secondary School

Principal Toor reported that the end of semester is nearing. Ojibwe language class created games using the Anishinaabe language. These turned out great and students are testing them out within the class. Students are also working on conjugating different verb tenses (Present, Past, and Future) as well as basic conversational phrases. The iPads have been very beneficial as students can make presentations with recordings of their voice and incorporate different pictures and characters.

Principal Toor advised that they are trying to grow the Native Studies Department at Twin Lakes Secondary School (TLSS). They are offering a new grade 11 Contemporary Aboriginal Voices course for next year, and are designing a broader multidisciplinary program with the help of Lisa Ewanchuk.

Next semester, the Native Studies grade 11 course will be going on several field trips which may include Lakehead University, and Georgian College.

TLSS also has a dedicated Native Studies classroom now, and look forward to gathering and showcasing a wide variety of artifacts for all students to see.

There are a few students in the Ojibwe class who are interested in the Aboriginal Arts & Stories contest. The deadline is mid-March and students can submit a written piece or drawing (essay, poem, song, portrait, graphic series etc).

Teachers are guiding students towards *Scholarshipcanada.com* which has many bursaries and scholarships specifically for First Nation students.

Lakehead University (Orillia) has an Aboriginal Speakers series. There will be opportunities for students in Semester two to attend one of these workshops.

Twin Lakes has been running a Students Success Initiative with a focus on First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students in numeracy for three semesters in total. The FMNI students have been yielding positive results with a high percentage FNMI students passing Grade 9 and 10 math courses.

#### **OD/Park Secondary School**

Principal Sammon reported that their self-identified First Nation, Métis and Inuit students continue to be supported by Lisa Snache and/or Sara Jamieson, FNMI Student Advisors.

A select group of 35 FNMI students attended a special Skills Canada workshop facilitated by their Aboriginal liaison, Christine Hannah. The hands-on workshop helped students to "follow their path" to find a career that provided balance and enjoyment.

The grade 10 NAC class continues to actively engage in their learning of Aboriginal culture. In the second term of the semester they have had the pleasure of hearing the authentic voices of

Dave Snake (Lakehead Orillia), Antoinette Dunmore (Northern experience) and Roseanne Mancari (healing circle) and are looking forward to a guest speaker from the AIDS committee of Simcoe County coming in January to talk to students about (among other things) being two spirited. Additionally, they visited the Aboriginal Resource Centre at the Barrie campus of Georgian College to look at pathways. During class time, students have created a giant medicine wheel, word wall and a miniature tee-pee symbolizing the tee-pee teachings. They have tried their hands at smaller medicine wheel collages, Métis dot art, medicine bag making and will be attempting concrete collages as part of looking at the residential school apology.

Students continue to sign up to take the grade 11 NBV course in semester two so planning is currently under way for some exciting educational opportunities for that cohort.

Principal Sammon reported that a highlight was a two day adventure at Mnjikaning Kendaaswin Elementary School. Everyone came back recommending this take place again in the future.

## Midland Secondary School

Principal Fletcher reported that this year, Midland Secondary School has a total of 74 FNMI students, 42 First Nation and 31 Métis who have self-identified. Out of the 74 FNMI students identified, 17 FNMI are attending 7<sup>th</sup> Fire. Beyond their teaching staff they have the additional support of FNMI Student Advisor, Ruth Quesnelle, who divides her time between the MSS and 7<sup>th</sup> Fire sites, Beausoleil First Nation Student Advisor, Sylvia Norton-Sutherland, who works with students residing on Christian Island, and FNMI Instructional Coach, Jaclyn Calder, who works with teachers of their grade 9 applied math and science courses through the Student Success School Support Initiative.

At MSS, one Native Studies course is scheduled this semester. There are 29 students in the English: Contemporary Aboriginal Voices, Grade 11, College Preparation (NBE3C) course.

# Focuses from October – January:

- Examining various experiences of Aboriginal individuals both on and off reserves through the study of literature
- Learning about Aboriginal issues from throughout history and present day, and why it is important to understand and recognize them today
- Utilizing their English skills to express their opinions regarding various Aboriginal experiences and issues
- FNMI Student Advisor presented to students regarding local Aboriginal issues and history
- Métis Nation of Ontario representatives led the students in the No Face Dolls activity to honour missing and murdered Aboriginal women

# Upcoming Focuses until the end of the course:

Students will be participating in Project of Heart, a hands-on, collaborative project to honour residential school victims and survivors, which will be one component of their summative assessment

Principal Fletcher reported that the FNMI Student Advisor meets regularly with Principal and Vice Principal, Student Success Teacher, a variety of MSS staff, Guidance and Attendance Counsellor. She also meets with First Nation, Métis and Inuit students in need of support and accessed community services as needed. She also provides consultations with parents as required. The Advisor is in contact with the First Nation Band Office representative. She works with PO and CAS. She attended monthly staff meetings and meetings with Students Success coordinators. She is working with FNMI students on "My Blue Print" to promote secondary program and postsecondary pathway planning. She has applied and received "Apple Grant" for 7<sup>th</sup> Fire nutrition program. There have been class visits and presentations presenting cultural activities. 7<sup>th</sup> Fire currently has 17 students enrolled who will finish off the semester. Courses offered this presented received for the semester.

semester are: English Program (ENG1L, 1P, 2L, 2P, 2D, 4C, NBE3E & 3C, and OLC4O); Native Studies (NAC2O, NBV3E and 3C); Math Program (MAT1L, 2L, 3E and 4E) and Food & Culture (HFC3E and 3C).

# Accomplishments October – January:

- Representatives from Métis Nation of Ontario led the students in the No Face Dolls activity to honour missing and murdered Aboriginal women
- Visited Enaahtig Healing Lodge for a cultural awareness and team-building day
- Prepared desserts for GBNFC Christmas Dinner
- Involved in a number of Christmas crafts and baking, including beading
- The Director of the GBNFC gave all of the student Christmas gift cards and invited all the students to the community Christmas lunch
- Guest speaker discussed multi-generational effects of residential schools

# Upcoming Initiatives & Partnerships:

- Students will be participating in Project of Heart, a hands-on, collaborative project to honour residential school victims and survivors
- Students will finish their independent project to research a topic of choice regarding Aboriginal issues, where they need to present their findings creatively and with hands-on crafts, which will also be a part of their final evaluation
- Guest speaker from MNO will facilitate Tobacco Cessation session in January
- TRACKS Youth Program session scheduled for February 13 to connect cultural teachings to contemporary science and ecology
- The student have the opportunity to earn their G1 and a driving course funded through the GBNFC
- The male students will continue to be part of the Gentle Man Circle once a week at the Friendship Center in the evening, run by staff of GBNFC

# Penetanguishene Secondary School

Principal MacIsaac reported that the first semester in the school year is quickly coming to an end. In the Arts Department students have been taking the grade nine Expressing Aboriginal Culture course. Community mentors have just completed their yearly visit to the class and demonstrated some traditional drum making techniques, including traditional teachings about the significance of the circle, the drum and teaching about the medicine wheel. Students then had the opportunity to make their own drum. Following the drum making lessons the students and teacher also talked about Metis culture and created dot art and finger weaving art. The upcoming weeks will have the class exploring Woodland culture and legend paintings.

During November students from the grade eight class at Christian Island Elementary visited PSS for the Take our Kids to High School day. The students had the opportunity to visit a variety of classes and experience some of the extracurricular activities at PSS. Students received some valuable information related to moving on to high school and in particular what PSS has to offer them next year in grade 9.

The First Nation, Métis and Inuit student advisor, Jennifer Noah has worked alongside the teaching staff and administration to support the FNMI students' social, emotional, intellectual, cultural and physical well-being. Jennifer is at PSS every Wednesday and has made some very positive connections with the students. Currently, as the end of semester comes about, Jennifer is seeking students to join her in taking part in the creation of a mural in the school.

We look forward to second semester beginning with many more opportunities to learn.

# Rama Student Advisor

Principal Ewanchuk reported on behalf of Student Advisor Lisa Snache. Lisa met with students regarding Mid Term Reports and provided additional academic supports as needed. She advised that monitoring academics is ongoing. Lisa reported that she attended Parent-Teacher Interview Nights at ODP and TLSS. The Aboriginal Post-Secondary Information Program was very well attended at both ODPARK and TLSS. Lisa assisted ODP Guidance with the Skills Ontario presentation for FNMI students in December. She attended the SAL Committee Meeting on Nov. 21/14. The MKES Grade 8 High School Presentation & Luncheon on January 9, 2015 at Rama, with TLSS Guidance presenting information.
