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#### **Glossary of Terms**

#### **Learning Environment**

Refers to the condition of educational spaces as they relate to the effectiveness of teaching spaces for program delivery.

#### **On-the-Ground Capacity (OTG)**

The capacity of the school as determined by the Ministry of Education by loading all instructional spaces within the facility to current Ministry standards for class size requirements and room areas.

#### **Primary Class Size (PCS)**

A province wide initiative to reduce primary class sizes. Boards must have 90% of their primary classes at 20 pupils or fewer. No primary or combined grade 3-4 class can exceed 23 pupils.

#### **Prohibitive to Repair (PTR)**

A school facility is deemed "Prohibitive to Repair" when the cost of renewing the building surpasses 65% of the cost of replacing the existing building (FCI>65%).

#### **Accommodation Review Committee (ARC)**

The review of two or more schools in order to develop viable and practical solutions for the accommodation of students within an accommodation review area. Reviews are to take place in accordance with Policy 2313, Pupil Accommodation Review.

#### **Attendance Area Review (AAR)**

The review of attendance areas of two or more schools in order to balance enrolment to address accommodation pressures being experienced at schools.

#### **Secondary Plans**

Secondary Plans are long range municipal planning documents which direct major infrastructure: arterial roads, servicing, schools, and community parks.

#### Introduction

Capital Planning is a five year rolling endeavor. Staff will continue to monitor each planning area as well as proposing study areas based on different Ministry initiatives which may alleviate certain "pressure points", or perhaps create new ones. Staff recommend to the Board of Trustees which study areas should be considered annually, with recommendations presented back to the Board of Trustees for a decision. Study areas are based on three distinct accommodation factors: condition of school facilities, program delivery, and enrolment fluctuations. These factors are the basis for the delivery of quality learning environments for current and future students of Simcoe County.

#### 2007 Capital Plan:

The Capital Plan recommended that five Accommodation Review Committees (ARCs) be undertaken and two Attendance Area Reviews (AARs). The Board approved these recommendations:

- ARC A Orillia DCVI, Park Street CI and Twin Lakes SS
- ARC B Collingwood CI, Elmvale DHS, Midland SS, Penetanguishene SS and Stayner CI

#### 2008 Capital Plan:

The Ministry announced a new capital funding process to school boards. A Capital Priorities template was to be completed identifying priority projects that were required up to and including the 2011-2012 school year. Only capital projects for permanent accommodation were identified as priority projects. Ministry funding was allocated on a project by project basis, based on the ministry benchmark costs for growth, PTR, and other factors that included localized accommodation pressure, consolidation, program enhancements, and facility retrofit. Seven priority projects were submitted to the Ministry on October 31, 2008, with supporting business cases:

Barrie Central CI Replacement School

Painswick South ps Growth School

Angus Morrison ES Consolidation with Frederick Campbell ES

Fred C. Cook ES Replacement School as well as consolidation with Bradford ES

The Ministry requested boards to submit a five year capital plan to enable the Ministry to look at long term capital needs in the province. A Capital Priorities template was completed identifying priority projects that were required up to and including the 2015-2016 school year. Only projects for permanent accommodation were identified as priority projects. Ministry funding was allocated on a project by project basis, based at the ministry benchmark costs for growth, PTR, and other factors that included localized accommodation pressure, consolidation, program enhancements, and facility retrofit. The Ministry requested boards to submit a five year capital plan to enable the Ministry to look at long term capital needs in the province. A Capital Priorities template was completed identifying priority projects that were required up to and including the 2015-2016 school year. Only projects for permanent accommodation were identified as priority projects. Ministry funding is to be allocated on a project by project basis, based at the ministry benchmark costs for growth, PTR, and other factors that included localized accommodation pressure, consolidation, program enhancements, and facility retrofit. The Alcona community attendance area is currently suspended until the Board receives notice regarding the new Alcona South ps. It is anticipated that funding announcements will occur in Spring 2014.

The other AARs are complete.

The Ministry requested boards to submit a five year capital plan to enable the Ministry to look at long term capital needs in the province. A Capital Priorities template was completed identifying priority projects that were required up to and including the 2015-2016 school year. Only projects for permanent accommodation were identified as priority projects. Ministry funding is to be allocated on a project by project basis, based at the ministry benchmark costs for growth, PTR, and other factors that included localized accommodation pressure, consolidation, program enhancements, and facility retrofit. Ten priority projects were submitted to the Ministry in January 2012, with supporting business cases:

#### **Simcoe County Growth**

Total

Simcoe County is comprised of 16 municipalities and two separated cities, with a population of 439,500 people.

In June 2006, the Province issued a new and substantive plan to better manage growth in the Greater Golden Horseshoe: the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe. The Growth Plan sets out a 25 year vision and integrated policies to curb urban sprawl and create livable neighborhoods and communities, while protecting valuable natural areas and water resources.

Simcoe Area: A Strategic Vision for Growth builds on the award winning Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, 2006. It proposes a strategy for the Simcoe area including Simcoe County, the City of Barrie and the City of Orillia and provides direction on managing growth that is occurring in this complex area governed by multiple municipal governments.

In October 2010, the Province released an amendment to the Simcoe Area vision for consultation, proposed Amendment No. 1 (OPA#1). Revisions to OPA#1 included adding Midland/Penetanguishene as an urban node and recognized the economic importance of the Lake Simcoe Regional Airport, Casino Rama, and two Highway 400 employment nodes at Highway 88 and at Innisfil Beach Road. 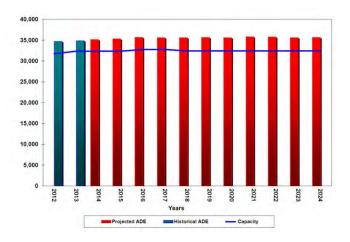

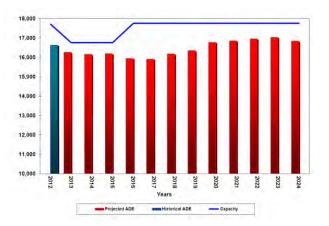

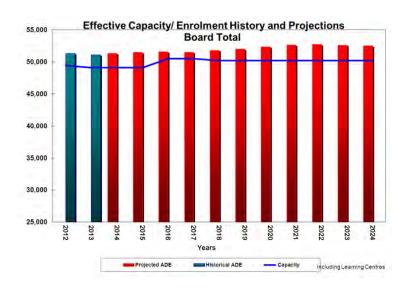

#### **RECOMMENDATION 1:**

South Central Elementary Planning area that includes Alliston Union Public School and Cookstown Central Public School.

**Alliston Union PS** is currently being constructed as a replacement school with an opening date of September 2014. It is situated on a 6 acre site. New attendance boundaries aligning boundaries between Ernest Cumberland ES and the new Alliston Union PS will take effect upon opening.

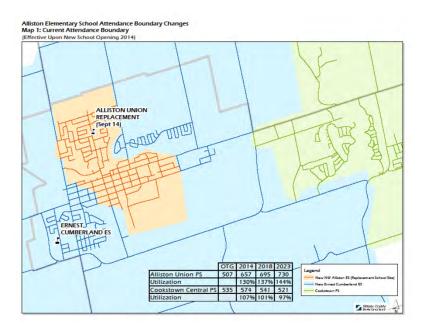
**Cookstown Central PS** was constructed 1959 with additions in 1971, 1995, and 2011 and is situated on a 15.5 acre site. The mechanical, electrical, structural and overall asthetics of the building are in fair to good condition. Life safety systems are not in compliance with current standards. The school is serviced by a private septic system. Cookstown Central PS is fully accessible. Cookstown Central has stable enrolment.

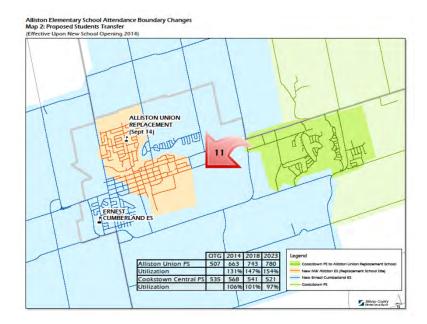
The recommended solution involves transferring approximately 11 students from Cookstown Central PS to Alliston Union PS. The primary purpose of the attendance area change is to transfer the "Tree Top" and "Green Briar" subdivisions to Alliston Union PS. No additional capital funding is required at this time.

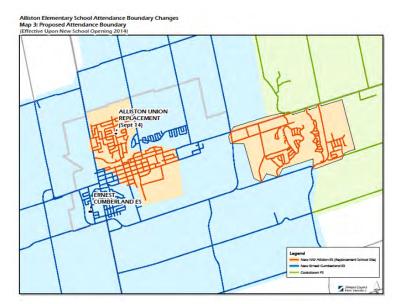

#### **RECOMMENDATION 1**







#### **RECOMMENDATION 2:**

That an Attendance Area Review be undertaken commencing in November 2014, in the North Elementary Planning area that includes Port McNicoll PS, Victoria Harbour ES and Waubaushene ES.

**Port McNicoll** was constructed in 1920 with an addition in 1974 and is situated on a 6.4 acre site. The mechanical, electrical, and structural systems are in poor condition and are in need of replacement and major repair. Improvements to flooring, paint and classroom acoustics are required. Minimum life safety systems are present in the building but do not meet the requirements of today's building standards. Classrooms do not have sufficient electrical service. The school is not accessible. The building envelope requires new windows and doors. The overall aesthetics require upgrading throughout. Programming enhancement is required. Enrolment is projected to decrease.

**Victoria Harbour** was constructed in 1961 with additions in 1967, 1981 and 1999 and is situated on a 9.6 acre site. The building is in good condition and is generally accessible. Life safety systems are in place but do not comply with today's building standards. Improvements to parking areas are required. The aesthetics within classroom spaces are good. Programming enhancement is required. Enrolment is projected to be stable with a slight increase.

**Waubaushene ES** was constructed in 1920 with additions in 1962 and 1985 and is situated on a 2 acre site. The mechanical, electrical, and structural systems are failing. Improvements to flooring, paint and ceiling tiles are required. Minimal life safety systems are present but do not meet the requirements of today's building code. Classrooms do not have sufficient electrical service. The school is not accessible. Enrolment is projected to decrease.

An Accommodation Review was completed in May 2012 with a recommendation to consolidate Port McNicoll PS, Victoria Harbour and Waubaushene ES into one school at the Victoria Harbour ES site. The closing date of Port McNicoll PS and Waubaushene ES is June 30, 2015. A capital priority has been submitted to support the consolidation.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 2**

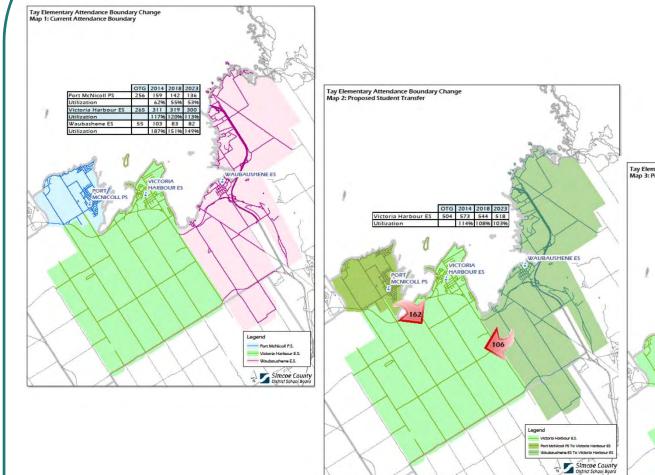
The proposed solution involves the consolidation of the three schools into one elementary school at the Victoria Harbour site. In order for the consolidation to occur, a capital priority has been submitted to increase the on the ground capacity of Victoria Harbour and complete program enhancements.

The recommended solution involves the consolidation of Port McNicoll PS, Victoria Harbour ES and Waubaushene ES into one school on the Victoria Harbour site. Approximately 160 students would be transferred from Port McNicoll PS and 100 students transferred from Waubaushene ES into Victoria Harbour ES. Capital upgrades to Victoria Harbour ES will be required to increase the capacity of the school and upgrade program space. The costs of these capital improvements are being requested through a capital priorities submission which was submitted in October 2013.

#### **Priority 1:**

Amend attendance boundaries to redistribute pupils within the Alcona area of Innisfil. The redistribution of pupils will require the construction of a new school.

An AAR is currently being undertaken to recommend accommodation changes to best serve the educational needs of Alcona Glen ES, Goodfellow PS, Sunnybrae PS and Innisfil Central PS. The Board has received FDK capital dollars to implement the FDK program, however, due to the number of pupils within this area, additional capacity and facility upgrades are required. In the 2010 Capital Plan, a new Alcona South ps was proposed. In 2012 the Board requested funding for an addition onto Innisfil Central. Today, neither priority has been approved. Growth in this area continues to occur, compounded by FDK implementation that now places the three Alcona schools into over capacity situations. A new Alcona school would alleviate these pressures.

The recommended solution involves attendance area changes at three schools; Alcona Glen ES, Goodfellow PS, and Innisfil Central PS, with a new school being proposed in the south Alcona area. Funding for the new school will be from Full Day Early Learning initiatives and Capital Priorities. A new elementary school is being recommended in the Capital Priorities list, already submitted to the Ministry of Education.

The specific information for these schools is found on pages 133-142.

#### **Priority 2:**

Program retrofits and an addition on Elmvale DHS.

Elmvale DHS's enrolment continues to be greater than its capacity, requiring program retrofits and an addition. The gymnasium and cafeteria are undersized. The addition/renovations would include appropriate capital projects to provide new renovated program space.

Partnership meetings have been held for this capital priority. Service clubs and the Township of Springwater are interested in providing capital for furniture and equipment and/or construction. Resulting facilities could then be used by the community.

The recommended solution is to construct a new gym, replace the cafeteria, enhance program and create new classrooms. This addition/renovation is recommended in the Capital Priorities list, submitted to the Ministry of Education. Partnership opportunities have been investigated to help off set the capital cost.

The specific information for these schools is found on pages 165-174.

#### **Priority 3:**

Consolidate the Port McNicoll PS, Waubaushene ES, and Victoria Harbour ES schools into one school on the Victoria Harbour school site.

An ARC was conducted for these schools which resulted in a recommendation to consolidate Port McNicoll PS, Waubaushene ES and Victoria Harbour ES into one school. Facility partnerships did not materialize which would enable a new school to be built on a new site. As a result the students will be accommodated on the Victoria Harbour ES site as a consolidated school.

In order for all of the students to be accommodated at Victoria Harbour ES, a nine room addition is required, as well as constructing a new gymnasium and converting the old gymnasium into a library.

Facility Partnerships have been investigated.

The recommended solution involves a consolidation of the three schools on the Victoria Harbour ES site, with an addition and renovation to Victoria Harbour ES. Funding for the addition/renovation will be from proceeds of disposition, Early Learning initiatives and Capital Priorities. An addition/renovation to the Victoria Harbour site has been included within the Capital Priorities submission to the Ministry of Education.

The specific information for these schools is found on pages 63-72.

#### Priority 4:

Consolidate Ardtrea/Cumberland Beach schools into one JK-8 school on the Cumberland Beach site.

**Ardtrea PS** was constructed in 1959 with an addition in 1967 and is situated on a 6.8 acre site. The mechanical, electrical and structural systems are failing. Improvements to flooring, paint and ceiling tiles are required. Classrooms do not have sufficient electrical service. Minimum life safety systems are present but do not meet the requirements of the current code. Significant lighting replacements are required. The school is accessible. The site is serviced with private well and septic systems. The Ardtrea site is restricted by its current well and reasonable use restrictions. There are continued air quality concerns despite continued efforts to rectify them. The main administration offices are located on this site.

**Cumberland Beach PS** was built in 1954 with additions in 1963, 1965, 1983 and 1984, and is situated on a 5.4 acre site. The mechanical, electrical and structural systems are failing. Improvements to flooring, paint and ceiling tiles are required. Life safety systems are not present in the building. The separation of the two sites creates parental concerns as siblings are separated. The continuum of program would be greater in a school organized in grades JK - 8. Students requiring additional support is seamless in the JK - 8 schools. The sites are separated by a four lane highway and are four km apart, creating supervision and safety concerns.

A new school on the Cumberland site is recommended. Water and sewer services have been installed at the Cumberland site.

The recommended solution involves a consolidation of two elementary schools in the Ardtrea/Cumberland Beach community, with a replacement school being constructed on the Cumberland Beach site. Funding for the replacement school would result from proceeds of disposition and Capital Priorities. A new consolidated school in this area of Cumberland Beach provides balance between current enrolment with the school capacities as well as eliminating the geographical separation concerns. A new elementary school for the Cumberland community is recommended in the Capital Priorities list, submitted to the Ministry of Education.

The specific information for these schools is found on pages 73-82.

#### **Priority 5**:

Recommendations from ARC 2010:02, Barrie Secondary Schools, are to replace the school supported by a viable financial partnership(s) to ensure adequate secondary facilities can be achieved on the Barrie Central Collegiate site.

The Board approved that upon securing viable financial partnerships by September 30, 2014, a capital priorities business case related to the shared development and use of a replacement secondary school on the Barrie Central Collegiate Institute site, would be pursued.

Facility Partnership meetings have been held and are continuing to be investigated to off set Ministry funding requirements.

The recommended solution is to construct a replacement secondary school on the Barrie Central Collegiate site supported by a viable financial partnership(s) to share in the development of the secondary school. This project is recommended in the Capital Priorities list, submitted to the Ministry of Education. Partnership opportunities will continue to be investigated to help off set the capital cost.

The specific information for this school is found on pages 185-194.

#### **Priority 6:**

An ARC is being conducted with the recommended solution to consolidate Midland SS and Penetanguishene SS into one school, located at Midland SS. The consolidation of facilities will require program and facility upgrades to Midland SS.

An ARC is being undertaken to consider the consolidation of Midland SS and Penetanguishene SS to address the declining enrolment and program needs at both schools. In order for consolidation to occur capital funding will be required to address both facility and program needs. It is anticipated that the capital funding for Midland SS will be used to increase and renew speciality program space, and renew the building envelope. It is estimated that the capital component will be approximately twenty-one million dollars.

The recommended solution involves the consolidation of Midland SS and Penetanguishene SS with renovations to Midland SS. Funding for the renovation will be from Proceeds of Disposition and Capital Priorities. A renovation to Midland SS is recommended in the Capital Priorities list, to be submitted to the Ministry of Education.

#### Section C - Full Day Early Learning Kindergarten Program

The Ministry of Education approved \$5.6 million towards capital improvements to implement Phase 3 of FDK. Funding has been directed towards internal renovations and additions to 17 of the 24 schools implementing FDK in phase 3. Projects are now completed.

Ministry of Education has approved \$4.8 million towards capital improvements to implement Phase 4 of the FDK. Funding went towards internal renovations and additions to 11 of 23 schools, as well as the approval of two elementary schools, Innishore South PS and Bradford/Fred C. Cook replacement. Capital works were completed for September 2013.

Ministry of Education has approved \$10.4 million towards capital improvements to implement Phase 5 of the FDK. Funding will go towards internal renovations and additions to 15 of 20 schools, as well as the approval of new elementary schools, Alliston Union replacement and Chris Hadfield PS. FDK funding is also proposed to be used to help fund the New Alcona South ps.

Capital works are to be completed ideally for September 2014.

In addition to the capital needs of the schools, FDK classrooms receive new learning materials, furniture and equipment where needed to ensure there is a standard in every classroom.

All FDK schools will also be provided with an outdoor learning space to ensure the outdoor portion of the curriculum can be met.

#### **Section D - Future Accommodation / Attendance Area Reviews**

Projections and data are used to recommend the accommodation of students, and address pressures created by aging buildings, enrolment pressures created by areas of growth and areas of decline, and program needs of all students. This information has been used to propose studies to alleviate these pressures.

The following chart outlines the schools which will be reviewed over the next five years in order to address these needs.

#### Section E – French Immersion(FI) /Extended French as a Second Language (EFSL)

With the implementation of French Immersion in 2013, there are several program locations that are experiencing facility or program pressures. The pressures will continue to grow over the next three years as the program expands by grade.

The pressures of the current French Immersion sites are as follows:

#### **Facility Pressures:**

- School On The Ground Capacity is less than the enrolment of the students attending the school
- Sites can not accommodate future portable additions due to septic system capacities
- Parking lots are not able to accommodate the increase in staffing complements and/or the student drop off and pick up

#### Program:

 The English enrolment numbers are low as the majority of the students are choosing the French Immersion Program

Projections indicate that the rate of growth for the French Immersion program by school can be categorized into two types, sustainable and rapid growth.

#### **Sustainable Growth:**

Typically the projections for the sustainable growth schools would have an overall French Immersion population of approximately 250 pupils. This is based upon 2 grades per year, with attrition built into the long term model resulting in a graduating class of 30 pupils.

#### **Rapid Growth:**

Typically the projections for the rapid growth schools would have an overall French Immersion population of approximately 400 pupils. This is based upon 3 grades per year, with attrition built into the long term model resulting in a graduating class of 60 pupils.

#### Section E – French Immersion (FI)/Extended French as a Second Language (EFSL)

Extended French as a Second Language has been implemented within Simcoe County for many years with stable enrolment. The program has been successful with the host schools being strategically selected to balance both the English and French populations, as well as ensuring the program could be accommodated with reasonable amounts of portables on site.

In 2013 busing was introduced to transport pupils to the Extended French sites. Enrolment for the Extended French program increased by 15%. This increase can be partially attributed to the availability of transportation as well as the overall growth seen in the grade 5 to 8 cohort. The overall percentage of students participating in Extended French is 10%.

In 2013, French Immersion was introduced to all schools currently housing the Extended French program. Approximately 13% of the grade ones subscribed to the French Immersion program are located in 10 schools.

This factor places the FI schools into new circumstances facing accommodation pressures and English program viability.

In order for a long term accommodation strategy for French programming to be created the following program directions are required:

- 1. Maximum percentage of grade 1 student intake
- 2. Capping the number of classes by school
- 3. Closing the FI school to out-of-area students (which would include siblings)
- 4. Extended French will be discontinued once the current grade ones reach grade 5
- 5. The minimum number of the English population remaining by grade
- 6. Single Track vs Dual Track

Once these overall decisions are made, accommodation recommendations will be possible.

#### Section E – French Immersion (FI) /Extended French as a Second Language (EFSL)

Once the overall vision of FI and EFSL is determined, there are several options available to address accommodation pressures,. They are as follows:

- Dual Track School
   Continue with both an English and French program model
- Single Track French Immersion School
   Create a school which accommodates only the French Immersion program
- Adding New French Immersion locations
   Create additional French Immersion locations to help alleviate the growth pressures at the current French Immersion schools.
- 4. Divide the French Immersion onto two school sites with one being primary and the other junior/intermediate
- 5. Attendance Boundary Review
  Recommend attendance area reviews to reduce English enrolment at the French Immersion sites
- 6. Reallocation of the feeder schools
- 7. Cap number of classes per grade
- 8. Capital Priority
- 9. Phase out or relocate Extended French

#### Section F - Program Renewal

#### **Technological Education Renewal Project**

SCDSB is currently in the second phase of a five-phase renewal of technological education in all secondary schools. The goal of the Technological Education Renewal Project is to position SCDSB as the provincial leader in technological education by 2017.

Phases 1 to 4 of the Technological Education Renewal Project include a significant investment into researching future educational and career opportunities for students, student health and safety, curriculum enhancement, teacher professional development, and renewal of technological education facilities and learning resources. The final phase of the project will put processes in place to ensure the on-going sustainability of technological education in the SCDSB.

Phase 1 accomplishments include the following:

- School renewal plans developed based on research within the Board and the analysis of educational and career opportunities for students;
- Implemented new health and safety procedures and purchased equipment, such as state-of-the-art welding fume ventilation systems. In addition, every teacher and principal received face-to-face training on an enhanced culture of safety in our technology programs;
- Began the multi-year task of fully renovating and revitalizing technology facilities to reflect today's educational and industry standards for a learning/working environment;
- Commenced the acquisition of modern learning resources for students in all schools, such as automotive scan tools, computer controlled routers, automation systems, and 3D printers.

Phase 2 is focusing on the following:

- Enhancing all technology courses of study to establish a high standard across the Board, ensuring an optimal learning experience for all students;
- Setting a base line of learning resources for all technological education programs;
- Establishing pilot health care and energy programs in collaboration with industry and education partners;
- Providing professional development and collaborative learning opportunities for technology teachers;
  - Continuing the enhancement of facilities and acquisition of new learning resources.

#### **Section G – Facility Partnerships**

The Ministry issued memo 2010:B1, Encouraging Facility Partnerships in February 2009.

The Board approved Policy 2345, Facility Partnerships on June 23, 2010. The policy sets out the need to communicate with communities, and addresses partnership suitability, co-building, shared use of unoccupied space facilities, agreements and cost recovery. Partnerships are to be explored and sought out by the board when constructing new schools, undertaking significant renovations and considering options for the use of unoccupied space in schools.

The 2012 Capital Plan identified capital priorities where the Board is actively seeking viable financial partnerships to support the submission of capital priority business cases, as set out below.

- a) New South Barrie ss
- b) Barrie Central Collegiate Institute
- c) Elmvale DHS addition/renovation

The Board is at various stages of determining if there are financially viable partnerships which could support or augment the Capital Priorities Business Cases. The following chart illustrates the status to date for each priority.

#### Section H - Environmental Initiatives

#### **Private Servicing - Sewage Treatment**

The SCDSB operates on-site sewage treatment systems at 32 schools as well as the Education Centre and six maintenance/operations centres. The construction of these systems date back to the 1960s and 1970s. Since that time, the approval format has changed including the Regulatory Authority, governing legislation and design standards.

SCDSB staff are currently conducting a review of existing on-site sewage systems in conjunction with the Ministry of Environment (MOE) to verify and document the condition and capacity of these systems. As a result of this review, there has developed a need for sewage system replacements and capital improvements and enhanced operational requirements where needed to satisfy new MOE policies and requirements.

The condition aspect of a sewage treatment system review determines how it is performing in relation to key performance or failure criteria. If there are significant signs of failure or stress, the estimated remaining functional life of the system must be determined, and a plan put in place for the eventual replacement of the system to current standards and code requirements.

The second aspect of the review is the determination of the capacity of the sewage system. While an existing approval may be in place from the authority having jurisdiction at that time (typically the Health Unit), the legislation and standards as they exist today are those against which the system capacity must be assessed. These include revised design standards for leaching bed construction and changes to design flow allocations per building occupant. Historically the approval of a system under the standards of the day may have supported a certain school population. The current standards for beds construction, sewage generation and effluent quality criteria may not translate to an equal capacity or student population. This in turn may lead to a requirement for the installation of enhanced nitrogen treatment technology (such as sequential batch reactors) to meet new MOE effluent quality criteria if an exiting school population is to be maintained.

Certain MOE requirements are known and defined, others are dependent on the outcome of groundwater testing and hydrogeological/engineering studies. These studies have now become a standard MOE requirement as part of the assessments underway and the possible imposition of Reasonable Use Policy criteria to existing sites where this is not a current requirement. These requirements will be undertaken.

Based on changes to environmental regulatory requirements and ever increasing attention to this area by the MOE, it is necessary to develop long range plans to budget for sewage system replacement and enhancement. In addition planning for the ongoing costs associated with these revised operational requirements will be essential.

#### **Section H – Environmental Initiatives**

# **Environmental Systems Energy Conservation, Waste Management and Environmental Education**

#### **Environmental Policy 2325**

The SCDSB Environmental Policy documents our responsibility to take a leadership role in environmental awareness and action. Under the policy, the Board has a commitment to sound environmental principles, reflected in its daily activities, decision making and future planning. Energy conservation, waste management, and environmental education are practices carried out by the SCDSB that assist in the implementation of this policy.

#### **Energy Conservation**

In April, 2009, the Ministry of Education announced a \$550 million investment to improve the energy efficiency of Ontario schools under the Energy Efficient Schools program. The funding was intended to be used to create more energy efficient learning spaces and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The SCDSB received a total allocation of \$9,611,181 to be spent over two years in three phases. This funding was allocated to 32 schools for various projects including: lighting retrofits; Building Automation Systems (BAS) installations and enhancements; mechanical upgrades; and window replacements. Since the implementation of these projects, the SCDSB has seen a decrease in consumption of electricity and natural gas as well as a decrease in the output of greenhouse gases.

#### **Energy Intensity Targets**

A standards document outlining the energy performance criteria for lighting, mechanical, and BAS systems was developed as part of the Energy Efficient Schools program. These standards have been adapted for retrofit projects and new construction projects. Currently, less than 20% of SCDSB schools operate at these standards. The energy intensity targets are based on the actual performance date from the top performing existing SCDSB schools. These were developed to be aligned with the targets set out in ASHRE's Advanced Energy Design Guide for K-12 schools, which aims to achieve a 50% energy use reduction, compared with ASHRAE 90.1-2004.

This table shows the Energy Intensity Targets that were created as part of the Energy Efficient Schools program. The targets are based on a natural gas-heated, electrically air conditioned school, excluding portables.

With the completion of the Energy Efficient Schools project in 2012, the creation of energy efficient standards, and the noticeable energy savings attributed to these projects, the SCDSB invested over \$1 million into energy conservation projects for the 2012-13 year. The funding for these projects came from the Energy Reserve Stabilization Fund, which had grown from budget under spending for heating and electricity from previous years in addition to incentives received from energy conservation projects. The intended purpose of the Energy Reserve Stabilization Fund is to build up an accumulated surplus from years when the energy budget is underspent to be available to offset energy costs when unusual temperatures result in above average energy use. Funds from this account were also used for capital spending in the construction of Hyde Park PS (\$540,727) and committed to the new Alliston replacement school (\$221,509).

#### **Ontario Power Authority Fee-In Tariff Program:**

The Ontario Power Authority (OPA) has developed the Fee-In Tariff (FIT) Program for the Province of Ontario to encourage and promote greater use of renewable energy sources including: on-shore wind; waterpower; renewable biomass; biogas; landfill gas and solar photovoltaic (PV) for electricity generating projects in Ontario. The objective of the FIT Program, in conjunction with the Green Energy and Green Economy Act, 2009 (Ontario) and Ontario's Long Term Energy Plan, 2010, is to facilitate the increased development of renewable generating facilities of varying sizes, technologies and configurations. The SCDSB was successful in the first round of applications under the FIT 2.0 program, granting 41 SCDSB schools with FIT contracts, a projected generating capacity of 4 MW of electricity. Most recently, 42 additional applications were submitted to the OPA for the FIT 3.0 program. Construction oft the FIT 2.0 contracts will commence in Spring 2014.

AMP Solar was awarded the rooftop licensing agreement and will pay the SCDSB \$0.80/sq.ft. of rooftop space utilized for the solar installations for FIT 2.0 contracts. The prices for FIT 3.0 contracts have yet to be determined. AMP will own and operate each system.

## **Next Steps:**

In order to maximize the amount of energy and dollars that can be saved, it is proposed that the retrofit measures and energy performance standards adopted under the Energy Efficient Schools project be extended to all SCDSB schools. It is important that energy savings and incentives received a part of energy efficiency retrofits and solar rooftop leasing are invested into additional energy conservation projects to support the achievement of energy performance targets and school based energy/environmental initiatives. An Energy Optimization Fund, created from energy savings attributed to energy conservation projects and incentives received, could be utilized to provide a sustainable funding source for the continuation of further energy conservation projects in order to expand ongoing cost saving opportunities to all SCDSB schools.

#### **Waste Management**

SCDSB currently participates in regular waste (garbage, recycling and organics) collection through various collection authorities. Consistent waste practices, including education and collection are necessary for reduction and diversion. Prior to the implementation of the County of Simcoe Learning and Living Green program and the SCDSB Recycles program, the SCDSB operated an in-house collection program where the Board purchased their own trucks, bins and dumpsters; sought out material recovery markets; and staffed the collection process.

Currently the SCDSB contracts with both public and private waste collection providers for the collection and disposal of various waste materials. This table shows the various waste collection service providers employed by the SCDSB and the materials they collect.

The move from the previous in-house collection program to the contracted external service providers has proved to be beneficial in terms of cost savings, increased diversion in recyclable materials, and the opportunity for the majority of SCDSB schools to participate in organics collection.

The most recent additions to the waste collection program are organics collecting at City of Orillia schools and the County of Simcoe secondary schools. The programs are optional and voluntary. The increase in accessibly to these programs is valuable to waste diversion, environmental education and complies with the Board's Environmental Policy.

#### **Recycling Bins**

There is a growing demand from custodial staff to replace existing recycling (blue and grey) bins. Many schools are using "mini" bins in individual classrooms and with the increase of allowable bulky plastics now eligible for recycling collection, the small bins are no longer adequate. Other schools require additional bins or bins to replace broken or missing ones. The County of Simcoe supplies the bins for the County schools at no extra cost to the board as per our agreement.

#### **Next Steps**

It is important that schools get the required bins promptly to maintain enthusiasm for the program.

#### **Environmental Education**

In March 2007 the Curriculum Council, which reports directly to the Minister of Education, appointed a working panel of experts to look at how children learn about the environment in Ontario classrooms. Shaping Our Schools, Shaping Our Future (referred to as the Bondar Report), the report submitted by the working panel, was adopted by the Ministry of Education through Acting Today, Shaping Tomorrow – A Policy Framework for Environmental Education In Ontario Schools. The policy framework provides guidance to school boards and schools on how they can develop or revise an environmental education policy, teach environment literacy and enhance the development of more environmentally responsible practices.

#### **Ontario EcoSchools**

This environmental education and certification program for grades K-12 helps school communities develop both ecological literacy and environmental practices to become environmentally responsible citizens and reduce the environmental footprint of schools. The program was created to assist schools in implementing and complying with Acting Today, Shaping Tomorrow. The SCDSB adopted the program in 2008. Since then, 22 schools have certified at either the bronze, silver or gold medal level. In order to achieve Ontario EcoSchools status, schools must carry out a series of environment initiatives in six categories: Teamwork and leadership; energy conservation; waste minimization; school ground greening; curriculum and environmental stewardship. Schools apply to be certified as an EcoSchool through an annual certification process which assesses and recognizes accomplishments awarding points in each of the six key areas. While the program is somewhat gaining popularity, SCDSB schools have been reluctant to participate in the program. Currently there is a 20% participating level in the Ontario EcoSchools program amongst SCDSB schools, while other boards are seeing 80%-100% participation levels.

#### **Green Teams**

Green Teams play an important role in carrying out daily operations at schools, specifically recycling and organics collection. The majority of SCDSB schools have adopted section 3.3 of the SCDSB Environmental Policy 2325 (green teams at each established Board site) and have incorporated this collection process as part of their environmental initiatives. Green teams are also important to the success of the Ontario EcoSchools program. These teams campaign, hold events, fundraise, participate in community stewardship initiatives and provide a voice to the student body about the importance of the environment.

#### **Environmental Investment Plan**

The SCDSB offers schools an opportunity to receive funding for environmental initiatives through the Environmental Investment Plan (EIP). Schools can receive up to \$2000 to pursue environmental programming (workshops, trips, etc), small physical upgrades such as water bottle filling stations, school ground greening, or other "green" initiatives. The SCDSB funds \$30,000 worth of environmental projects through the EIP each year.

#### **Next Steps**

To see increased participation in Green Teams and Ontario EcoSchools, it is necessary to provide additional resources in the form of in-school workshops, professional development for all staff, green values embedded into Board culture, and best practices sharing and networking opportunities. Although participation is low, the SCDSB has some great success stories. Of the 22 schools that have been certified over the past five years, five have achieved gold status, some of which have obtained this status over multiple years. This year, Terry Fox ES has qualified to apply for platinum certification, the first year this status is being offered.

#### Section I - Surplus Property

The board's property assets are being studied. The surplus land study is examining two groups of sites. Group one includes administrative and vacant sites, and group two includes active school sites. Sites are being assessed to determine areas that may not be integral to the efficient operation, need and use of the board.

The board approved Report No. CL-BF-D-1, Surplus Property: Group One Recommendations dated September 5, 2012, that declared the William B. Wright, Wyebridge and Bond Head administrative sites surplus and approved of their disposition. The Collingwood Bus Garage was also declared surplus and approved for disposition.

Pursuant to the Ministry Requirement to offer the properties for sale to prescribed agencies, and having completed the process with no interest, the Board is currently pursuing the private sale and or long term lease of the sites.

Phase two of the Surplus Property Study will initiate the severance of parcels of existing school sites in 2014. Prior to severing lands for development, the board will consider whether the subject lands are deemed to be surplus and approved for disposition.

#### Section J - Child Care

The SCDSB works with community child care providers to operate full day child care centres, before and after school programs, PD day and holiday programs available for children in schools. These programs create seamless daily experiences for children by offering programs to non-school age children in licensed child care settings as well as programs for school age children outside of regular school hours in familiar school environments with consistent programming by each of the operators.

There are 17 licensed child care centres located within SCDSB schools catering to children 1.6 to 3.8 years of age.

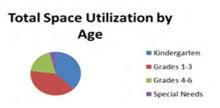
The before and after school, PD day and holiday care programs are a part of the new full-day Kindergarten Program. They offer age appropriate inquiry based programs for children from junior kindergarten to 12 years old outside of their regular school hours.

In the 2013/14 school year:

- o 67 schools are offering before and after school programs
- 28 schools are offering PD Day and Holiday programs

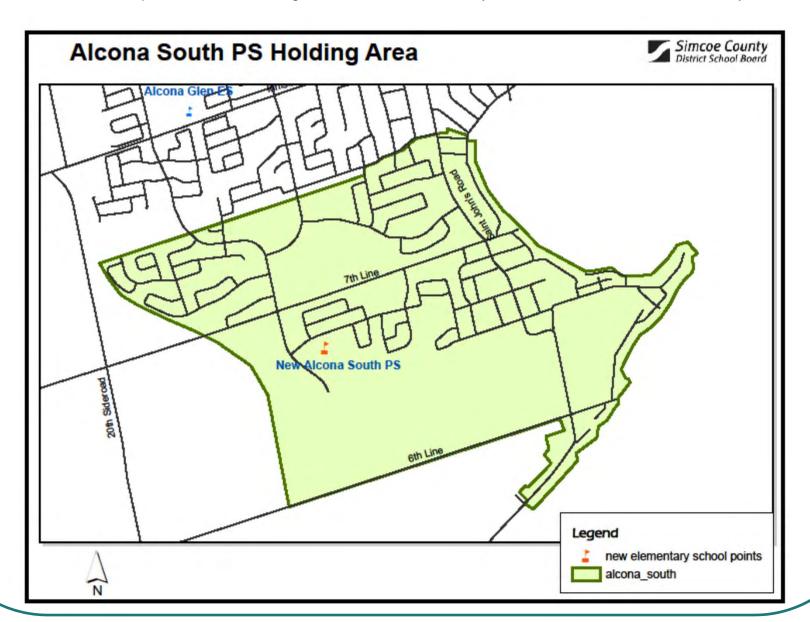

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### **Capital Funding Summary:**

Capital funding provides the Board with revenue to construct new schools and additions and renovations in existing schools. These projects are a result of capital priorities approved by the Board and subsequently approved by the Ministry.
